HIGHER EDUCATION TALKS AND WORKSHOPS

Delivered at your school or college

These flexible sessions can be delivered as standalone classroom activities or as part of a wider event such as a parents' evening or careers day. Just let us know the year group, timings and setting and let us do the rest.

Introduction to higher education

Key Stage 3, 4 and 5

This inspiring talk introduces students to the world of higher education and can be tailored for specific year groups. It covers the benefits of studying at higher education level and how to effectively research different courses and universities in order to make informed decisions about the future.

Life as a university student

Key Stage 3, 4 and 5

Hear our current students speak frankly about their journey into higher education. While each has their own personal story, our students will cover a range of useful topics such as accommodation, managing their money and answering the question of 'what do students do all day?'.

Study skills and revision techniques

Key Stage 3, 4 and 5

This session can help introduce new study techniques and 'revisions hacks' in order to prepare for upcoming exams. It aims to cover a wide range of topics including target setting, learning styles and how your environment can affect learning.

Employability skills

Key Stage 3, 4 and 5

The university experience is about gaining more than academic knowledge. This workshop looks at the wider skills and experiences that can be gained through higher education and how these are valued by employers.

Writing your UCAS application and Personal Statement

Key Stage 5

The Personal Statement is a crucial part of the UCAS application process and is the key opportunity for students to highlight why they should be offered a place on the course they're hoping to study. This topic can be delivered as a talk or a workshop. It includes an overview of the UCAS application process and University interview process; useful advice, guidance and top tips on how to write the most effective Personal Statement.

Student finance and budgeting fundamentals

Key Stage 5

For many students, finance is a major concern and a barrier to entering higher education. This talk aims to dispel the myths and prepare young people with key budgeting skills through various interactive activities.

Post-16

Key Stage 3 and 4

A full day including lunch giving students the opportunity to see what life as a drama student at university is like. Working with our current students, learners will take part in a textual analysis and then spend the afternoon bringing scenes to life in our purpose-built drama studio. From sound and lighting, costume and makeup to staging and props, students will get a full and immersive experience in drama.

13 February 2019

Explore English (Game of Thrones)

The Game of Thrones novels and TV series provide excellent opportunities for introducing students to questions of genre, mode and adaptation. The morning session will concentrate on Epic, Saga and Fantasy through the exploration of literary examples and comparisons with R R Martin's texts. In the afternoon, students will consider the challenges and successes of adaptation as well as the issues of canonicity that arise out of the TV series running ahead of its source material.

Offering a unique opportunity to focus on JK Rowling's work in a university setting, we aim to demonstrate how literary study at degree level includes a range of different approaches. 
